When I wrote last year's report I really hoped that by the time I wrote this one the landslip would finally be behind us, but sadly not quite yet. Hopefully it won't be too much longer! 2016 has certainly seen a lot of progress on that front, and the wood has gained some new railings, matching a truly beautiful new seat.



The group has grown during the year, with 63 members on our email distribution list (up from 52) and we have undertaken some varied work, from filling in holes created by bottle-mining to installing bat boxes. As ever, *Durham University Conservation Volunteers* have provided us with many hands and much enthusiasm, which is greatly appreciated.

This year we obtained our first photographic evidence that the wood is visited by a wide range of mammals, including badgers and roe deer, and on our bat walk we discovered that it is home to at least one large bat roost. Hopefully 2017 will bring more such discoveries.
